Final Evaluation Report: Open Water Swimming Pilot Project

MEECH AND LEAMY LAKES 2022

> Benjamin Hiard, Program Officer, Outdoor Activities, NCC April 2023

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Summary

This final evaluation report on the open water swimming (OWS) pilot project at Meech and Leamy Lakes ties in with various initiatives undertaken since the pandemic began, leading to official approval of OWS in Gatineau Park for the coming years.

The NCC views the introduction of OWS in a favourable light, in particular because this activity will make it possible to:

- Provide better disciplinary oversight at both lakes.
- Strengthen safety measures for all users.
- Facilitate cooperation between the community of swimmers and Meech Lake residents.
- Better regulate use of the areas at various sites (beaches/boat launches) with a view to limiting shoreline erosion.

Following our analysis of the data, observations, consultations and communications received by the NCC and based on the 2021 and 2022 evaluation reports, it is recommended that <u>open water</u> <u>swimming at Meech and Leamy Lakes be included in Gatineau Park's permanent summer</u> <u>recreation offer.</u>

By including OWS in its recreational offer, the NCC will be investing in program oversight via its current operating budget.

The equipment required to implement the program, including signage and swim buoys, will be set up at Meech and Leamy Lakes in mid-May of each year and removed in mid-October.

The launch of the OWS program is scheduled for May 20, 2023.

<u>Timeline</u>

- 2020: OWS issues emerge at Meech Lake.¹
- 2021: first year of the OWS pilot project.
- 2022: second year of the OWS pilot project.
- 2023: OWS is included in the recreational offer at Gatineau Park and the NCC Quebec Urban Lands.

1. 2022: Second year of the pilot project

1.1. Equipment, signage and logistics

- May 12, 2022: seven signalling structures and related signs with respect to private property were installed (see Appendix IV), together with 16 swim buoys at Meech and Leamy Lakes, albeit closer to the shore than in 2021.
- May 19, 2022: a swim buoy in Hope Bay was relocated.
- July 8 & July 12, 2022: two signalling signalling structures were added at O'Brien Beach and Leamy Lake to identify the starting point more clearly.
- ➢ July 9, 2022: signs were added with reminders about regulations prohibiting the launching of boats at Blanchet and O'Brien Beaches.
- October 12, 2022: the OWS equipment was removed.²
- > 30+ hours: logistics-related time for setting up and removing the equipment.

1.2. Observations and monitoring at the dedicated sites

<u>Reminder</u>

At each site with a starting point for OWS, the staff was required to:

- Inform swimmers about measures governing the pilot project.
- Remind them about regulations governing the beach sites and the P12 boat launch.
- Observe any swimmers:
 - Not complying with the designated swimming area or the 30 m zone along the shoreline.
 - Not using a bathing cap and/or a swim buoy.
 - Not starting from the designated entry point for OWS.
 - Complying with all three of these measures.

A total of eight trained employees with experience using the observation checklist (see Appendix II) took turns making observations during the season.

In addition:

- 86 patrols were carried out, including 42 water patrols, compared to 8 in 2021.
- 95% of the interventions were educational in nature.
- 223 interventions were carried out with members of the public, compared to 113 in 2021.
- 12 tickets were issued, primarily for failing to wear a life jacket.



1.3. Follow-up committee – Park dialogue

- > Three meetings were held in 2022 (April 26, August 9 and November 22).
- The same members were in attendance, primarily swimmers from the National Capital Open Water Swimmers Alliance (NCOWSA) and Meech Lake residents.
- > Minutes of the meetings are available in Appendix III.
- Official and group dialogue followed on from informal and individual discussions between members prior to implementation of the pilot project.


1.4. Analysis of data at Meech and Leamy Lakes

Based on meters set up at the Meech Lake beach sites, the three diagrams below show the usage patterns. The first diagram specifies the number of users for each day of the week before, during and after the beach monitoring period (10 a.m.-6.00 p.m.). The second indicates the number of users per time slot. The third diagram shows the overall number of users at both sites during the season (May-October).




The above diagrams provide some useful information:

- As in 2021, the number of users is more constant at Blanchet Beach during the week and throughout the season, whereas the number of users at O'Brien Beach increases significantly on weekends and during the beach monitoring periods.
- These data are in line with the on-site observations: Blanchet Beach site is more popular than O'Brien Beach for OWS despite the smaller designated area at Blanchet Beach and the lower capacity of the P13A and B parking lots (only 60 spaces).




- The number of users is also constant during the day at Blanchet Beach, whereas attendance at O'Brien Beach peaks around mid-day during the beach monitoring period.
- Opening the P11 parking lot in the morning to provide access to O'Brien Beach (5 a.m.) does not seem to offset the attraction of Blanchet Beach, even though it opens later (7 a.m.).



• The seasonal visitor numbers show slightly higher volumes at Blanchet Beach as this site is prized by users for its charm and tranquility.

1.4.1. Blanchet Beach





<u>Left</u>: map from signs posted at the site entrances <u>Right</u>: data aggregated by individuals using the Strava app⁴


- > There is a marked tendency to use the designated open swimming area.
- The left-hand diagram shows the corridor used by swimmers setting off from P13, while the right-hand diagram shows the route used by pleasure craft (canoes, kayaks, paddleboards) setting off from the P12 boat launch.


The following diagrams show the observations recorded at the Blanchet Beach site by NCC staff.








Based on the Blanchet Beach observations:


- Compliance with OWS measures is much greater in the morning, when open water swimmers, particularly groups and clubs, frequent the site. This trend is evident throughout the season.
- Before the beach monitoring season and prior to the 10 a.m. start of monitoring once the season begins, 40% of swimmers do not set off from the designated starting point. Prior to the monitoring season, this may be due to the presence of a fence used to control Canada geese that redirects swimmers farther away from the official starting point. During the season, the access point along the swim buoys is quite narrow and uninviting.
- Swimmers without gear are mainly seen in the early afternoon.
- In general, non-compliance with OWS regulations and measures is seen in the midafternoon.


The diagrams below illustrate the observations made at the O'Brien Beach site by NCC staff.

Based on the O'Brien Beach observations:

- Compliance with the designated OWS area is widespread throughout the season, as it was in 2021. Compliance merely varies at mid-day during the beach monitoring period. In that case, the individuals involved leave the bathing area and do not pay attention to the designated OWS area; this practice, however, is not widespread.
- The starting point issue is the same as at Blanchet Beach, i.e. the starting point is narrow and uninviting, on the edge of the buoy line, and is often strewn with obstacles (branches).
- Swimmers without gear are primarily seen in the early afternoon.
- In general, non-compliance with OWS regulations and measures is seen in the midafternoon. The main infraction is the use of paddleboards, which are prohibited⁵ in the area sectioned off by the buoy lines. On weekends, users tend to head to this site when the P12 parking lot is full (paddleboards are permitted at the boat launch there).


1.4.3. Boat launch in the P12 parking lot at Meech Lake

Of the 667 users observed at the boat launch in the P12 parking lot, 48% were paddleboard enthusiasts, while 44% were canoeists and kayakers. In addition, 4% were dog walkers, while 4% of the swimmers there were unauthorized (see details in the table below). These observations primarily involve bathers in July-August who remained near the boat launch. During the season, there are a few open water swimmers in the morning.

1.4.4. Leamy Lake




<u>Left</u>: map from signs at the site entrance <u>Right</u>: data aggregated by individuals using the Strava app




The rectangular area corresponds to the route of the Gatineau triathlon, which is held in early July.


Useful background information

- The beach at Leamy Lake is much larger than either of the two Meech Lake sites.
- The parking capacity at Leamy Lake is significantly larger (400 places vs. 200 places in the three Meech Lake parking lots).
- The site is very accessible on foot, by bike/car or via public transportation.
- The navigation channel for boats has been temporarily out of operation since 2020.
- The beginning of supervising bathing has been delayed until July four times since 2017 (due to flooding, particularly in the spring).
- Groups of triathletes typically train during the week.
- The Gatineau triathlon is a major annual event held on the site.









Based on the Leamy Lake observations:

- The ratio of open water swimmers complying with the designated swimming area is comparable to that at Meech Lake, with 75% of swimmers observed in the designated area.
- This ratio declines in the evenings until mid-July when groups train for the Gatineau triathlon: they do not set off from the designated starting point and use an alternative route to the designated swimming area that matches the triathlon's rectangular route. Once the triathlon is over, the compliance rate for the designated area increases significantly.
- 95% of the open water swimmers have the proper gear. In general, the number of open water open water swimmers is lower, although they are experienced and use Leamy Lake during the week.
- The regulatory compliance issues are significant, mainly because many canoes, kayaks or paddleboards⁶ dock in the designated bathing area or encroach on the designated OWS area.

2. Issues and recommendations

The issues outlined below are in line with those identified in 2022 and 2021.

Issues	Recommendations
Low rate of compliance with OWS regulations and measures at mid-day at Meech Lake (11 a.m 3 p.m.) and on weekends during the beach monitoring period.	 Preferably assign resources (Gatineau Park staff and NCC conservation officers) during this critical period. Ask life guards to issue reminders about OWS measures at noon and 2 p.m.⁷ Have an appropriate supply of bathing caps on hand so staff members and head life guards at beaches can hand them out to swimmers who need one. Set up meters near the starting points at Leamy Lake. Upgrade the regulatory signage at the beach sites (refresh the pictograms and signage at the far ends of the beaches, post reminders at the P12 boat launch and Leamy Lake that life jackets must be worn by recreational boaters). Continue to disseminate best practices among the swim clubs, groups and the Meech Lake residents' association.
Starting points are narrow, uninviting and poorly identified.	 Set up a flag and an archway to identify and designate the starting points for OWS. Evaluate the possibility of limiting the buoy line for bathing without detracting from the bathers' experience. Prune the trees near the starting points, particularly since branches hamper visibility at the narrow starting point on the right side of O'Brien Beach. Close the unofficial trail on the south-eastern side of Blanchet Beach to prevent swimmers from setting off from there.
Use of bathing caps and swim buoys is required as part of the regulatory measures.	 Upgrade the signage at the sites and on the website – the practice guides, the other swimming site managers consulted and NCOWSA members have all come out in favour of using either a bathing cap or a swim buoy. The NCC will recommend that individuals use a bathing cap and a swim buoy, without making this an actual requirement. Other proposed measures⁸ are included in the permanent offer.

⁸Depart from and return to the designated access point; at all times, swim in an anti-clockwise direction in the designated OWS areas or less than 30m from the shore; be visible: wear a fluorescent bathing cap or a swim buoy, the use of which is strongly recommended; limit noise between 9 p.m. and 7 a.m.; do not trespass on private property.

O'Brien parking lots at Meech Lake (P11) and Leamy Lake are underused in the mornings.	 Develop the offer and incentives for groups and users to use the O'Brien and Leamy sites (lockers, hourly rate, agreements, etc.). Send out messages to the OWS groups and clubs and remind them of the advantages of setting out from these sites. Ensure that a minimum safety zone is maintained for open water swimmers in the event that the Leamy Lake navigation channel is in operation.
Boats are not allowed to accompany open water swimmers.	 Regulate OWS at the Leamy Lake site, which is both larger and safer. Together with the new concession holder, evaluate the possibility of gear rentals by groups.
Conflicts with motorized watercraft.	 Explore the idea of a "go-slow zone" near designated OWS areas, in line with Transport Canada's evaluation.
Maintain and upgrade the equipment and install more visual cues on the watercourse.	 Include equipment maintenance and upgrades in the operating budget for Gatineau Park and the NCC Quebec Urban Lands. Number the buoys, assign them a colour and attach a reflective strip marking off a specific distance; ensure that they correspond to the maps at the starting points and on the website.
Enhance skills acquisition.	 Evaluate best practices for regulating OWS (new guides, etc.). Visit sites such as Mont Tremblant, Beauport Lake, Memphremagog Lake or, on a smaller scale, the Lake Simon nautical centre.
Enhance the offer at the existing sites.	 Evaluate the impact of adding swim buoys at the Blanchet Beach site in the direction of McDonald Bay. Re-evaluate the designated OWS area at Leamy Lake based on the evaluation of swimmers' practices.

3. Including OWS in the summer offer and next steps

After analyzing the data, observations, consultations and communications received by the NCC and based on the 2021 and 2022 evaluation reports, <u>open water swimming at Meech and Leamy Lakes</u> **should be included from now on in Gatineau Park's permanent summer recreation offer.** The equipment required to implement the program, including signage and buoys, will be set up each year at Meech and Leamy Lakes in mid-May and removed in mid-October.

OWS will not be authorized at other NCC-managed sites on the Quebec side of the border, particularly at Philippe and La Pêche Lakes, due to the types of clientele and activities there, in addition to conservation issues, alignment with the Gatineau Park Master Plan and the untapped potential of the Leamy Lake site.

The NCC views the introduction of this activity in a favourable light for the abovementioned reasons. This project has made it possible to:

- Provide better disciplinary oversight at both lakes by offering guidelines to be followed and constant monitoring aimed at raising the awareness of swimmers, bathers, canoeists, kayakers, paddleboarders and beach users in general.
- Limit the impact of OWS for residents thanks to the closure of the parking lots and oversight of the pilot project (ongoing presence of conservation officers and NCC staff to raise awareness).
- Strengthen safety measures for swimmers, canoeists, paddleboarders and kayakers by installing swim buoys with lifelines and whistles attached to them in case of an emergency.
- Suggest swimming corridors by placing buoys at strategic intervals. The setting is thus more inviting for training sessions involving open water swimmers or triathletes. The recreational plan is certainly enhanced by installing effective visual aids and obstacle-free swimming corridors for users.
- Facilitate dialogue between the community of swimmers and Meech Lake residents.
- Reduce the number of complaints relating to OWS, in comparison with 2020 and prior years.
- Better regulate usage at beach sites or boat launches (this will have a positive impact on shoreline erosion).
- Limit interactions with wildlife, in particular loons, by restricting OWS to certain well-defined areas.

The launch of the OWS program is scheduled for May 20, 2023.

By including OWS in its recreational offer, the NCC will be investing in program regulation and oversight via its current operating budget.

EGR : Please keep your tone respectful, per what we discussed at the beginning. Thank you. (after multiple interventions from AL asking if there was a question)

BH: We will increase our presence at Meech Lake in the evenings.



		 A couple residents with homes immediate adjacent to P12 have also noticed a difference. Happy there's less traffic because beach at Blanchet doesn't open until 7. One commented that they've seen NCC presence – which isn't to say they don't still see swimming, but it's less overall. Also fewer late-night parties, which is not a swimming thing specifically, not a good thing nonetheless. General concern that people are swimming down the lake, and they're very difficult to see. Primarily morning and evening. Worried about potential accidents. Safety is really the key here, so perhaps NCC efforts need to be concentrated on ensuring people stay within corridors or 30m buffer. 	
7	CF	I'm particularly concerned about swimming NW to SE. My observations are not consistent with what I've heard this evening. Sunday, I counted eight people at different times coming down the middle of the lake. Problem here is that people using powerboats or waterskiing – who need to be compliant with federal and provincial safety rules – need to take these people into account, which is difficult if they can't see them. So to Lissa's point about enforcement, we need to see NCC people on the lake ticketing these folks. I've spoken to a few, and I can tell you they're not interested in any discussion about the matter, and used very base language. One accident and this will be all over every newspaper in the country.	AdE: Although we're here to talk about open water swimming, if you're seeing things like bonfires, we do want to hear about it – that's illegal. Please also report people you see swimming illegally – not every call will warrant an immediate reaction, but we do compile complaints, and it helps us make our point and ask for enforcement resources when we need them. Also helps make schedules for conservation officers to be there at certain moments.

Our observations surrounded the rules brought forward in the pilot project, and that's what we collected data on.
11	Jeff	I question whether those rules – and adherence to them – is an indication of the level of safety. In terms of officer interactions, were there instances where safety truly was an issue? I didn't observe any, and I saw hundreds of swimmers on Saturday mornings. Can we conclude that this past season was a very safe one for open water swimming at Meech Lake?	I think we have to step back to where we were two years ago in terms of what we noticed onsite: many occurrences of trespassing on private properties, noise in the morning, other issues of conflict onsite.
